Rats!

Have rats moved into your home or property? Rats are attracted to places where they have access to food. Rats can get food from many sources, but the most common food sources in the Portland area are bird seed, chicken feed and backyard (not curbside) compost. All three of these sources of food have one thing in common: Humans put them out and therefore, there is a distinct connection between human behavior and rat behavior. The best way to control rats is to focus on what has attracted them. First, identify their food source. Next, secure or remove the source. Finally, replace the source of food with mechanical traps or chemical rodenticides.

If you are dealing with rats inside your home, the first step is to inspect the exterior of your home to locate and secure the access points. Seal up all holes the size of a dime (mice can fit through a hole this size and it's important to keep them out too) and larger to prevent access.

Multnomah County Vector Control can assist you in locating these access points, as well as determining the reasons why rats may be finding your property attractive. Multnomah County is not an exterminator, but our vector experts can perform a free inspection and offer advice as well as snap traps and bait stations (up to three of each per property). Richmond Ready: Prepare Your Disaster Water Supply

The best place to start with your disaster preparedness is by getting an emergency supply of water. Water is essential for survival. The average person can survive for about three weeks without food but only 8-10 days without water. Due to the subduction zone earthquake threat, water providers now recommend that we each maintain a 14-day supply of water.

It can be hard to get excited about storing water when you live in a rainforest, but it's something we all need to do. Our water systems are complex and, at several points, vulnerable to earthquakes. Portland's water system was built long before the advent of seismic design standards. The water bureau is working to strengthen the system but that will be a long term effort. Japan's infrastructure is relatively resistant to ground-shaking since earthquakes are so common there. Nonetheless, the 2011 Tohoku Earthquake, which was a subduction zone earthquake, like the one we will eventually have, disrupted the water supply to about 2.3

million homes. So it should not surprise any of us when we find that our taps are dry after the ground stops shaking.

On top of that, earthquakes are not the only threat. Mechanical failures and contamination can disrupt or degrade our water system. Last summer, the Eagle Creek Fire came very close to the Bull Run Reservoir and burned several acres in the watershed. Floods and landslides can also threaten our water system.

There is a lot of guidance on how to prepare your emergency water supply. The Regional Water Providers Consortium's website tells you everything you need to know. Go to **regionalh2o.org** and check our their 'Emergency Preparedness' page. Simply sanitizing and filling up several five-gallon containers will do the trick. Smaller containers, including re-purposed liter soda bottles, are easier to maintain and refill than larger containers. Coming up with a water storage solution should not be a barrier. There are plenty of effective and inexpensive methods. The most important step is to make a decision to do it.

Quick Water Storage Tips

Create a water plan to include: stationary and portable storage and equipment to filter and treat water when you need to make questionable water Spring Cleaning, continued from page 1.

safe to consume. Don't forget to sanitize your container before you fill it up!

DO store water:

- in a UV-resistant, food-grade container protects it from bacteria and algae growth
- in polyethylene-based plastic containers look for numbers 1, 2 or 4 on the bottom of the container
- in a cool, dark place
- in soda and Gatorade bottles
- on top of a wood board or cardboard so that odors and chemicals do not leach in

Do NOT store water:

- in milk jugs, they will break down over time and any live cultures that remain in the jug could make you sick
- in disposable water bottles, they will also break down
- in containers that have previously held chemicals (liquid or powder) or fuel
- sitting directly on concrete or near harsh fumes or chemicals, containers will absorb the chemicals from these!

50th/52nd Aves.) and clean up graffiti at residential intersections people have "adopted," and at locations along Hawthorne and Division in Richmond.

The RNA is partnering with SOLVE, KINK Radio's "Paint the Town Green" event, the City's Graffiti Abatement Program and Keep It Pretty Rose City anti-litter campaign, Metro, SE Uplift District Coalition, the Division-Clinton Business Association (DCBA), Hawthorne Blvd Business Association (HBBA), the Sunnyside Neighborhood Association, and with Hawthorne and Division businesses, such as New Seasons and Fred Meyer.

How to Sign Up to Volunteer

To sign up for the June 16 event, either to pick up litter or clean up graffiti, go to the SOLVE website: **solveoregon.org/opportunity/a0C1I000002IAfd** This event is a SOLVE cleanup event.

The event is modeled after the very successful RNA-Friends of Trees event: 9am registration with coffee & snacks at the church, with graffiti cleaning and litter pickup safety talk and demonstration, then 2-hour cleanup on Hawthorne and Division, then lunch at the church 12 – 1pm. We will provide lunch and free raffle with prizes.

Adopt an Intersection

Sign up to clean the intersection near you. Would you like to remove the graffiti on the street signs near where you live? The RNA and the City's Graffiti Abatement Office can help you by providing a graffiti cleaning kit, a quick training at this June event, and you can get some assistance in cleaning the graffiti.

Once people have the materials to clean graffiti off of signs (only the backside) and they realize how simple and fast it is to remove graffiti, and how to report front-of-sign graffiti to the city via pdxreporter.org (the front of signs have a reflective coating that requires special cleaning), the idea is that people who have "adopted" their intersection see to cleaning their nearby street signs or will report it to pdxreporter.org.

Volunteer to be a Team Leader
